- 5. Specific sewing skills related to sewing for the home.
- 6. Awareness of the safety factors involved when making selections for the home as well as setting up a workspace.
- 7. A consumers' awareness of sources in the community for equipment and supplies.
- 8. Awareness that these skills could be transferred to the job market.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

At the completion of the course the student will demonstrate an ability to:

- 1. Identify and explain ways in which environmental characteristics affect ones' physical and psychological well-being.
- 2. Recognize and use the elements of design in selection and construction of projects.
- 3. Select fabrics and supplies appropriate to their needs and resources.
- 4. Measure accurately.
- 5. Estimate yardage.
- 6. Use specific sewing skills for the project at hand.
- 7. Use time-saving techniques whenever possible.
- 8. Maintain a safe/efficient workspace.
- 9. List community resources for equipment and supplies.
- 10. Identify acquired skills that are transferable to the job market and discuss in class how to market them.

APPROPRIATE ASSIGNMENTS THAT DEMONSTRATE CRITICAL THINKING

Assignments that demonstrate critical thinking may include, but are not limited to, measuring accurately and estimating yardage.

EVALUATION

The student and the teacher will evaluate the success of the course using student evaluation of course content and teacher plus one or more of the following methods:

- 1. The student will set goals and evaluate the achievement of these goals upon completion of the course.
- 2. The student and the teacher will evaluate his/her project(s) and make suggestions for improvement in future projects.
- 3. The class will participate in evaluating completed projects at the end of the course taking into consideration the quality of the design and the workmanship.
- 4. Student attendance and participation in class activities.
- 5. Student will demonstrate ability to plan for and construct one or more of the projects demonstrated in class.
- 6. Student will make their own reference folder of basic seams, hand-sewing techniques, and by making samples using the various machine feet.
- 7. Student will demonstrate their knowledge of design elements through their choice of materials and designs for their projects.

METHOD OF INSTRUCTION

Lectures, visual aids, demonstrations, field trips, class activities, hand- outs, and student projects.

This course, or sections of this course, may be offered through distance education.
