CATALOG COURSE DESCRIPTION

This course will assist students in establishing a photo editing workflow that will make organizing, editing and sharing of digital photographs quick and easy. Students will learn best practices for organizing, finding and viewing photographs. Topics covered will include retouching and enhancing, separating objects from their backgrounds, creating custom slideshows, and archiving tools and methods. Instruction will include using layers and layer masks, such as applying photo effects and filters that will enhance both Joint Photographic Experts Group (JPG) and RAW (digital negative) digital photos. - 6. Understand how to present keywording strategies for quickly locating photos for projects and presentations
- 7. Use photos to create projects to share as E-mail attachments or prints
- 8. Become familiar with photo effects, filters, styles and graphics
- 9. Learn how to apply special effects to photos
- 10. Understand blend modes and layer masks

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion of the course, the student will be able to:

- 1. Identify the different types of photo editing software
- 2. Use photo editing software to edit JPG and RAW files using an established workflow
- 3. Transfer files from a camera to a computer, external or cloud-based storage device
- 4. Demonstrate how to create, move or rename a folder using a PC or a Mac computer
- 5. Select the best preference for editing workflow
- 6. Create and apply keywords using categories and subcategories and find photos based on provided keywords
- 7. Share a photo project via Email or print
- 8. Use blend modes and layer masks to enhance photos
- 9. Define filters and use difference brush types to enhance photos
- 10. Learn to use enhanced editing tools to create transparent backgrounds, place selections in another photo and adjust facial features.
- 11. Create an image slideshow, calendar and collage using edited photos
- 12. Precisely convert photos to black and white, use design cutter tools, refine edges, merge photos and add text to a photo
- 13. Create high dynamic range photos using edited photos
- 14. Create panoramas using both JPG and RAW files

APPROPRIATE READINGS

Reading assignments may include, but are not limited to, assigned readings from textbooks, supplemental reading assignments, industry-related periodicals or magazines, manuals, online help pages, articles posted on the Internet and information from web sites, online libraries and databases. Topics should be related to Digital Photography and include camera-specific videos that show features and operation of cameras.

OUTSIDE ASSIGNMENTS

Outside assignments may include, but are not limited to, appropriate internet research, reading from assigned textbooks and completing the assignments at the end of each chapter and studying as needed to perform successfully in class. An assignment might include downloading photos from the camera to a hard drive, opening the photos in a photo editing software tool and performing basic edits on that photo.

APPROPRIATE ASSIGNMENTS THAT DEMONSTRATE CRITICAL THINKING

Assignments which demonstrate critical thinking may include, but are not limited to, applying photo editing workflow to downloaded photos, organizing and applying appropriate keywords and using photos in software projects for sharing.

EVALUATION

Evaluation that a student has met the course competencies will include multiple measures of performance related to the course objectives. Evaluation methods may include, but are not limited to, performance in a variety of activities and assignments, such as completing a research project individually or in a group, hands-on projects, class participation, written and practical tests, attendance and punctuality.

Upon successful completion of all courses in the program, a Certificate of Program Completion will be issued.

METHOD OF INSTRUCTION

Methods of instruction may include, but are not limited to, lecture, open discussion, hands-on demonstrations, computer-assisted instruction, or field trips. Students will also be expected to participate in online class discussion posts, in-class discussions and project reviews.

This course, or sections of this course, may be offered through distance education.
