COURSE GOALS

- 4. Directional and non-directional verbs.
- 5. Nouns derived from verbs.
- 6. Present, past, and future tense forms.
- 7. Pluralization including use of numbers, quantifiers (number words), classifiers as quantifiers, reduplication, and repetition of pronominal classifiers.
- 8. Location including adverbials of place (HERE and THERE), THIS/THAT, verbs incorporating location, and location of classifiers (locational relationships).
- 9. Numbers to count objects or people, express age, express time, to count from 1-30; 100; 1,000, and ordinal numbers (first, second,... ninth).
- 10. Fingerspelling for names and places.

Cultural Objectives - The student will have a basic understanding of the following:

- 1. The history of Deaf people and ASL.
- 2. The varying cultural and language background of Deaf people.
- 3. Organizations of Deaf people.
- 4. Publications related to Deaf people (not professional journals).

The student will be able to use appropriate cultural behaviors for communicative as well as cross-cultural functioning including:

- 1. Communicative attention getting.
- 2. Conversation turn taking.

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- 3. Conversation regulating.
- 4. Distance between signers.
- 5. First meetings.
