COURSE GOALS

The student will be introduced to the legal side of the medical office as an employee, by exposing them to legal concepts of standard of care, scope of employment, criminal and civil acts, contracts, negligence, and ethical concepts.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Upon successful completion, the student will be able to:

- 1. Explain the difference between the standard of care required of professional and nonprofessional personnel by the courts.
- 2. Identify legal obligations that employment in a medical office carries with it for the patient, employer, employee, and the state.
- 3. List the difference between criminal and civil causes of action.
- 4. Differentiate in writing and/or orally between a felony and a misdemeanor.
- 5. Identify the elements that make a contract.
- 6. Identify different kinds of contracts.
- 7. Analyze and compare causes of action for negligence and for malpractice.
- 8. Identify the legal, moral, and ethical aspects of informed consent.
- 9. Explain the importance of medical record credibility.
- 10. Explain the basic discrimination law in hiring, promotion, and termination.
- 11. Explain the difference between law, morals, ethics, and etiquette.
- 12. Identify living wills and durable powers of attorney with relation to the medical office.
