CATALOG COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is an introductory through advanced course in arts and crafts for adults (55+). The course will provide an opportunity for practical application, using diverse media (digital or traditional) and techniques, in the production of decorative art items for personal use and gifts. This course will explore the principles of art design and its place in our culture as well as other cultures. The type and length of art project(s) is determined on a class-by-class basis. Projects may include flower arrangements, book art, printmaking, mosaics, calligraphy, needlework and textiles, wood work, cultural crafts, scrap crafts, and digital art. (FT)

- 1. Identify the artistic resources that are needed to complete projects and describe how/where to obtain required materials.
- 2. Experience working with a variety of different mediums such as paint, clay, fabric, metal, wood, paper, flowers, yarn, etc.
- 3. Select and use the proper tools and equipment required for various design procedures
- 4. Compare and contracts the cultural differences in the approach, content, and design of decorative art.
- 5. Design a project that demonstrates the ability to complete a task.
- 6. Plan a project that demonstrates the ability to complete a task.
- 7. Plan projects, share ideas, and identify goals.
- 8. Critique and define at least three of the basic design principles.
- 9. Evaluate the work of fellow students and examine the art principles used.
- 10. Appraise an art or craft object using skills learned in class.

OUTSIDE ASSIGNMENTS

Outside assignments may include, but are not limited to, maintaining sketchbooks, picture references, portfolios and journals appropriate for their individual needs.

APPROPRIATE ASSIGNMENTS THAT DEMONSTRATE CRITICAL THINKING

Assignments which demonstrate critical thinking may include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Evaluating and critiquing works of art as assigned in class (verbally, digitally and in writing)
- Understanding arts and crafts in a variety of cultures is achieved by the following actions: 2.1. Student will compare and contrast the media used.
 - 2.2. Student will evaluate and compare the design elements used.
 - 2.3. Students will interpret the importance or function of art in different cultures.
 - 2.4. Students will discuss (verbally, digitally and in writing) how are and artist are influenced by historical events, training, and artistic circumstances.
- 3. Creating a project is achieved by the following actions:
 - 3.1. Students will develop a concept.
 - 3.2. Students will decide which principles of design to incorporate.
 - 3.3. Students will assess which materials are needed.
 - 3.4. Students will evaluate and determine which media to use.
 - 3.5. Students will choose the appropriate procedures.

EVALUATION

Students will be expected to evaluate their own growth and development. The instructor will evaluate the success of the course using student evaluation of course content and one or more of the following methods:

- 1. The student will set goals and evaluate the achievement of these goals upon completion of the course (self-reports).
- 2. Student participates in quizzes and surveys.

- 4. Student will provide a plan for enrichment activities including museum visits and art community involvement.
