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## Purpose

In response to a Districtwide initiative regarding Open Educational Resources (OERs), San Diego Continuing Education (SDCE) Office of Institutional Effectiveness, in conjunction with the SDCE Office of Instruction, created the 2016 SDCE Open Educational Resources Survey. The survey was designed to assess current use and satisfaction with open educational resources, as well as in-classroom cost of non-OER materials.

## Methodology

In November 2016, the SDCE Office of Institutional Effectiveness sent all adjunct and contract faculty email invitations with a URL link to the online SDCE Open Educational Resources Survey. A total of 753 email invitations were sent via the SDCE adjunct and contract list serves. The administration window for the survey was approximately one week. In an effort to increase survey response rates, a reminder to complete the survey was sent mid-data collection.

The survey instrument was designed to take approximately 5-10 minutes to complete. The survey contained 8 forced-choice single response questions (categorical or confirmation/satisfaction Likert scales), 1 forced-choice single response question set (satisfaction Likert scale), one multiple response question set, and two stand-alone verbatim response questions. Additionally, several questions allowed respondents to provide verbatim responses either in addition to or in lieu of a categorical response.

To ensure confidentiality, surveys were collected and compiled by the SDCE Office of Institutional Effectiveness. Respondents were informed that data would be reported in an aggregated summary of the results, with open-ended comments reported verbatim. While 78 surveys were partially or fully completed, percentage results for each question are reported among only those participants who responded to the question, so total counts may vary by question.

The OER Survey elicited participation from 78 faculty which resulted in a 10.4% response rate. Forty-two percent of all respondents were adjunct faculty, 40% were contract faculty, and 14% did not provide a response. Compared to the proportion of adjunct and contract faculty invited to participate (85% and 15%, respectively), adjunct faculty are underrepresented in response to the survey and contract faculty are overrepresented in response to the survey. With this in mind, findings should not be generalized to all SDCE faculty; rather they should be considered the opinions of only those faculty who responded to the survey.

## Findings

### Open Educational Resource Use

- The majority of faculty (71%) who responded reported that they are not currently using OERs in their classes.
- According to faculty not using OERs or not widely using OERs, 64% are considering beginning or expanding OER use in their classes, with nearly half (47%) of those faculty planning implementation for Spring 2017 and close to one third (31%) planning implementation for Summer or Fall 2017.
- Respondents considering OER use most often cited a reduced cost to their students as incentive for future use, while respondents who felt they were unlikely to use OERS often cited lack of knowledge or familiarity with OERs and a belief that OERs are not appropriate for their students or their field of study.
- The top three OERs currently in use in respondent's SDCE classes are images, music, or movies (65%); exercises, labs, simulations, etc. (45%); and lectures available on podcasts (40%).

### Satisfaction with Open Educational Resources

- Over half (56%) of respondents are generally satisfied with OERs. However, fewer respondents (51%) are satisfied specifically with the quality of OERs, and only 40% are satisfied with the quantity of OERs. A large percentage of the respondents were neutral in their satisfaction or dissatisfaction with OERs (42%, 40%, and 50%, respectively), which based on respondent comments, is largely due to lack of familiarity/knowledge about OERs.

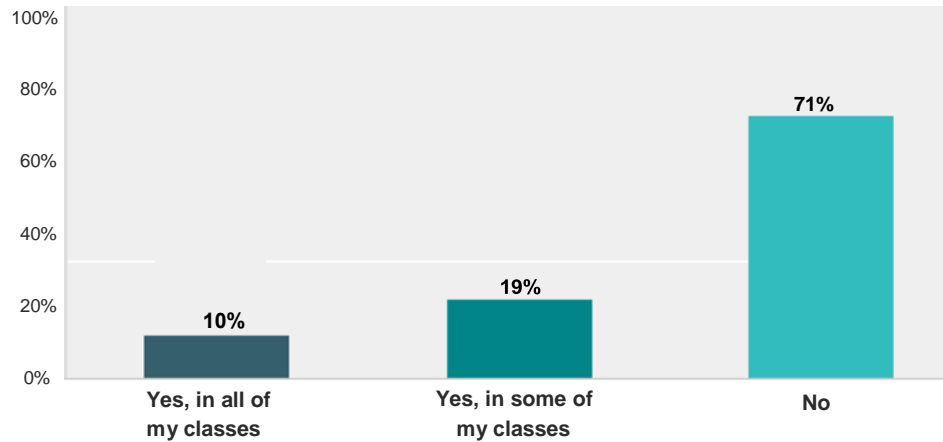
### In-Classroom Cost of Textbooks and Materials

- The majority of respondents (60%) reported that students incur a cost for textbooks in their classes, with 47% noting that textbooks are between \$26 and \$50 per class. Eighty-eight percent of respondents reported there is no charge for materials in their classes.

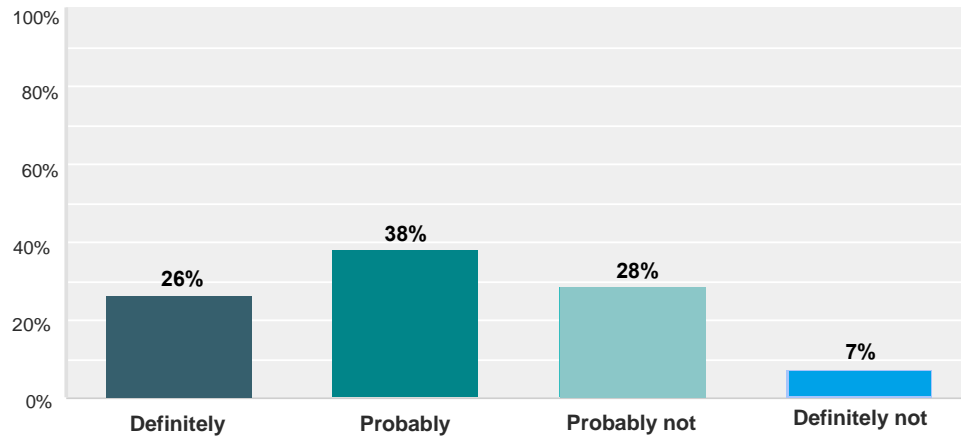

**If Probably Not or Definitely Not:**

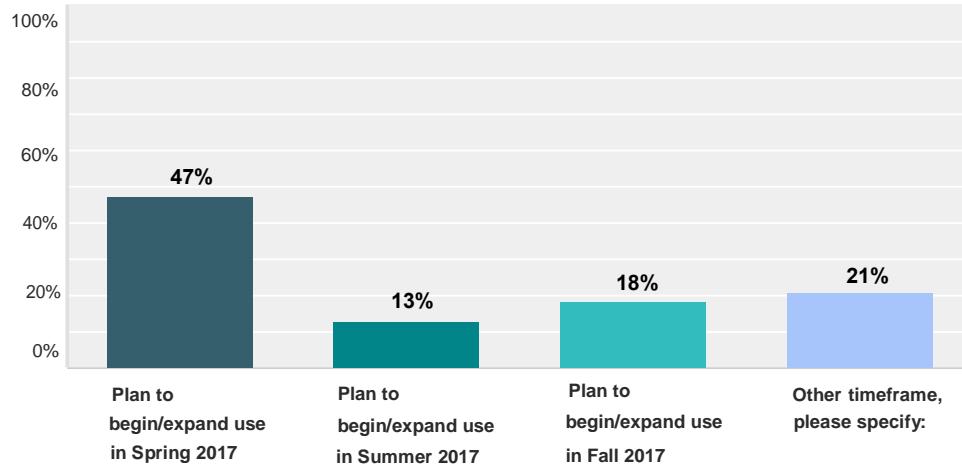
1. didnt know they existed

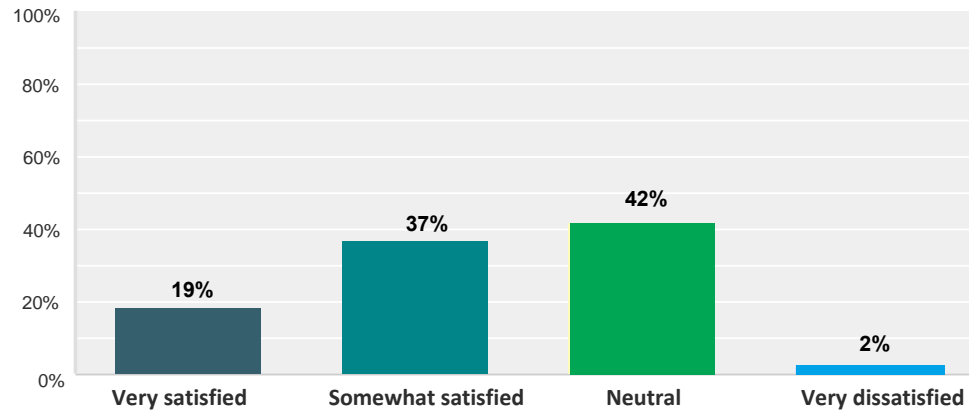

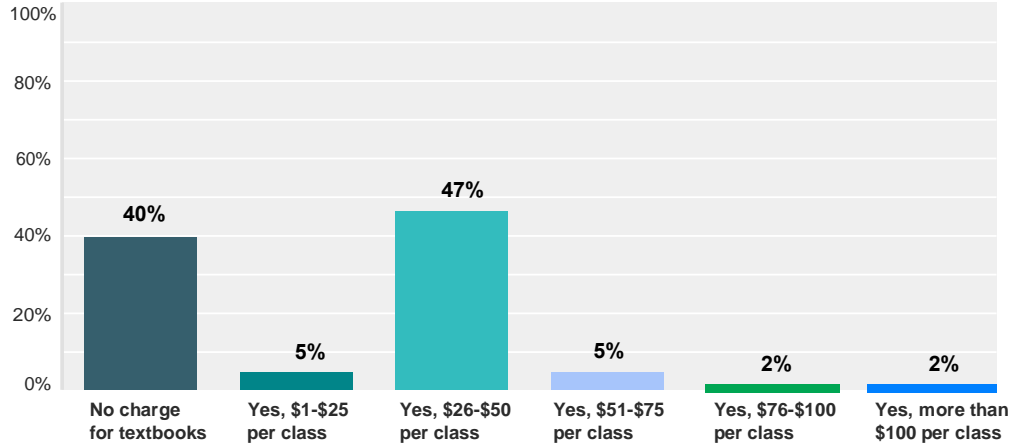

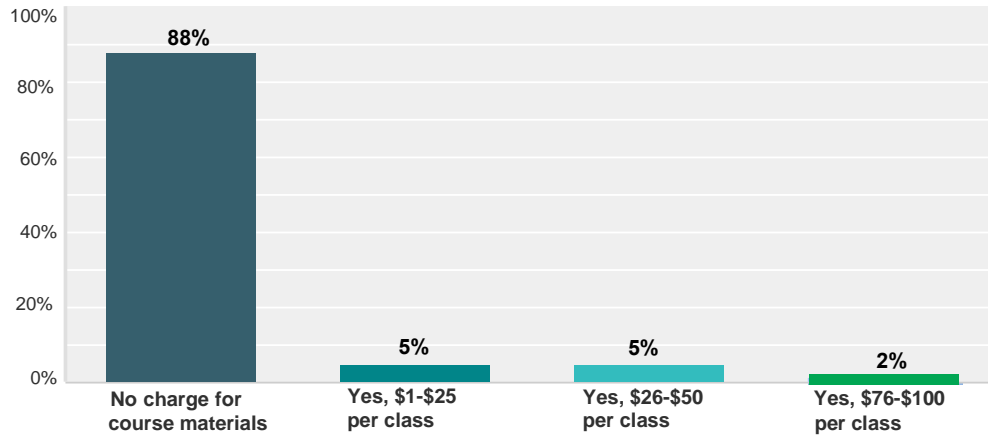
