English as a Second Language (ESL) & Citizenship SLO 2 Highlight: Effective Communication Best Practices

The ESL program measures SLOs for writing for seven levels of instruction. The focus on writing is important because inadequate writing skills prevent students from getting better employment or transitioning to higher education/career training. Instructors identify writing objectives related to SLOs in their course syllabi to inform students of the writing goals and criteria for course completion. Writing instruction and practice, scored with a level-specific rubric throughout the semester, builds students' competency in this area and gives students feedback for improvement and goal setting.

In 2023/24, ESL implemented program-wide formative SLO assessments at the midpoint of the semester to ensure that instructors were monitoring students' writing skills and planning instruction accordingly to help students develop level-appropriate competency. Summative SLO writing assessments also take place near the end of the semester so that students can see their progress and achievement.

Based, in part, on SLO assessment results, instructors provide students with recommendations for the next semester's enrollment. Students who are unable to pass the SLO writing assessment are typically recommended to continue studying in the same skill level course an additional semester or are transferred to a class with more of an emphasis on reading and writing. SLO writing assessments also inform changes in course offerings to better serve students.
